President Ramaphosa Addresses 2018

Armed Forces Day

President Cyril Ramaphosa has applauded the South African Defence Force for their role in actively promoting the Defence Force as a career of choice. President Ramaphosa was addressing troops in Kimberley during the 2018 Armed Forces Day celebrations. He says SANDF will this year lead the rejuvenation of the Naval Dockyard which is set to create 570 high technical jobs and 4,500 indirect job opportunities over the next five years. *Please read the rest of President Ramaphosa's speech below...*

I am honoured to be back in Kimberley for the second time in four days to join the South African National Defence Force and the people of the Northern Cape in hosting Armed Forces Day.

At the interfaith service I attended on Sunday, I saw in our armed forces a reflection of the South Africa we are constantly seeking to build.

I saw the diversity of our country enveloped in your uniforms.

I saw – just as I witness today – black and white South Africans, young and old, men and women, together.

I saw discipline, commitment and professionalism.

And I saw the warmth of our national character shining through.

The participation of all faiths in the Sunday event was a reminder of the inclusive society we are building.

It was heartening to see the wonderful, creative talent of men and women in uniform on display.

On Sunday, it was our men and women in uniform who lifted the spirit of our nation through the soaring voices of soloists, trumpeters, saxophonists and the vibrant defence choir.

So when we look at our armed forces we see a manifestation of the South Africa that belongs to all of us, black and white, which our Constitution directs us to build.

This day is a reminder that our soldiers are an integral part of us, not an external force.

You are bedrock of our communities.

You are our mothers, fathers, sons, daughters, friends, neighbours.

We dare not fail to appreciate how the peace we enjoy lives alongside the constant vigilance and readiness that enables you to keep us as safe as we are.

You are opening incredible opportunities for young people in both the public and private sectors.

South Africa's defence technology is globally sought after.

Much of our technological capability shows that we are well positioned, through our armed forces, to participate in the Fourth Industrial Revolution.

This has established our defence sector as an important contributor to innovation in our economy.

It has made defence a sector where young people can exercise not just their physical capabilities, but their creativity and exercise skills across a broad range of endeavours – from catering to intelligence gathering, to engineering and project management.

Fellow Compatriots,

A decision was taken in 2012 to proclaim the 21st of February as Armed Forces Day.

It commemorated the day in 1917 when the SS Mendi was sunk in World War I.

The SS Mendi was transporting 823 members of the 5th Battalion, the South African Native Labour Corps to France, when it was struck by the SS Darro.

Over 600 black troops died in the disaster.

It is a day on which we remember the bravery of soldiers prepared to fight in a war that was not theirs.

It is recorded that as the SS Mendi sank, the soldiers chose to die with dignity and honour.

It was this tragedy that SEK Mqhayi recalled in his poem, 'Ukutshona kukaMendi'.

In it he writes:

Could we have sacrificed anything more precious?

What did it mean to sacrifice a village?

Was it not giving the bull calves of your homestead?

Sending those very ones who loved you as a nation?

We're talking deep now; we have added our voice,

Proudly we are part of those opening the road to freedom.

In the way Abel was the sacrifice of the earth?

In the way the Messiah was the sacrifice of heaven?

Be consoled, all you orphans!

Be consoled, all you young widows!

Somebody has to die, so that something can be built;

Somebody has to serve, so that others can live...

This day has become a day that allows us to remember all men and women who have paid the ultimate price in defence of freedom, peace and justice.

It reminds us that blood was spilled by many of our people to guarantee us our freedom and dignity.

It is a reminder that honourable and courageous men and women continue to put their lives on the line to secure our peace and defend our Constitution.

Compatriots,

This year, Armed Forces Day celebrations carry a profound and special meaning for our nation. They occur at a time when our defence force has once again demonstrated the deep roots of our Constitutional dispensation. They are even more significant because they occur in a year when South Africa commemorates the centenary year of our icon and first Commander-in-Chief, President Nelson Rolihlahla Mandela.

It is this SANDF that President Mandela envisaged as a non-partisan unifier and defender of all South Africans.

President Mandela oversaw the formation of the SANDF as a force that upholds the Constitution of the Republic in defence of all its people.

President Mandela left behind a disciplined SANDF that protects our territorial integrity and supports peace and development initiatives on the African continent.

Thank you heartily for your patriotism and for lending a hand in the renewal and development of our beloved country. We applaud the major role that the Department of Defence is playing in actively promoting our Defence Force as a career of choice.

During the past year, the South African Navy continued to lead the Department of Defence's participation in Operation Phakisa.

Through Operation Phakisa, the SANDF aims to enhance ship-building. During this year, the SANDF will lead the rejuvenation will commence with the building of patrol and survey vessels for the South African Navy to rejuvenate the national ship building industry. This project will create 570 high technical jobs and 4,500 indirect jobs over the next five years. The SANDF conducted various maritime border safeguarding operations under Operation Corona, ensuring the safety and stability of South Africa's maritime zones.

.Operation Thusano is a departmental initiative with the Cuban armed forces that involves the maintenance and repairing of the SANDF operational vehicle fleet.

From inception in 2015, over 4,000 vehicles have been repaired and several workshops in SANDF units revived.

A total of 446 South Africans are apprentices and a further 395 have qualified as technicians through transfer of practical knowledge by the Cubans.

As I mentioned in the State of the Nation Address, I will soon be visiting the leadership and management of our national departments to see how well we can work together to accelerate the imperatives of service delivery, training and job creation.

As Commander-in-Chief of the South African National Defence Force, I will be prioritising my engagement with the Department of Defence.

On this historic and auspicious day, I wish you well and thank you once more for your loyalty to our country and for your service to our people.

President Cyril Ramaphosa Addresses SANDF

Inter-faith Church Services

President Cyril Ramaphosa on Sunday paid tribute to the South African National Defence Force (SANDF), saying the defence force has again confirmed the depth of the roots of South Africa's democracy.

He was speaking during an inter-faith church service at Mittah Seperepere Convention Centre in Kimberley during Armed Forces Day build up events.

The celebrations which were held on Wednesday to commemorate 21 February 1917, marked the "heroic sacrifices of our soldiers who died that fateful morning when the SS Mendi sank in the English Channel" killing 646 people.

"It has become a day that allows us to remember all men and women who paid the ultimate price in defence of freedom, peace, and justice. It is a day that reminds us that blood was spilled by countless South Africans and freedom fighters to guarantee us our freedom and human rights. It is a reminder that brave men and women continue to put their lives on the line to secure our hard-won freedoms and defend our Constitution," Ramaphosa said.

"This year, these celebrations carry a profound and special meaning for our nation. They occur at a time where our defence force has once again confirmed the depth of the roots of our democracy and the flourishing of constitutional order.

Ramaphosa says the celebrations occur as the nation celebrates the change of leadership in the governing party without any appetite for senseless bloodshed because the defence force is led by wise women and men who abide to the ideal of the supremacy of the Constitution and the rule of law.

They were even more significant because they

occurred in a year when South Africa commemorated the centenary birthday of the first commander in chief, former president Nelson Mandela.

It is this SANDF – the people's national defence force – that our founding father president Nelson Mandela envisaged as a non-partisan unifier and defender of all South Africans. As its first commander in chief president Mandela moulded the SANDF into a law-abiding institution that upholds the Constitution of the Republic in defence of its people.

"President Mandela left us a coherent SANDF whose task is to diligently safeguard the sovereignty and territorial integrity of the Republic, build peace, and support development on the African continent. He left us a national defence force that is a true microcosm of our diverse society," Ramaphosa said.

SANDF Rolls Out Coaching Clinics

The South African Defence Force has rolled out a number of coaching clinics at both Galeshewe Stadium and Karin Muir swimming pool in Kimberley in the Northern Cape. The clinics included rugby, netball, softball and swimming amongst others. The sporting activities started from Saturday, 17th of February until Tuesday 20th February 2018. They formed part of build-up programs towards the National Armed Forces day which was held to commemorate the 1917 SS Mendi accident.

Karin Muir swimming pool in Kimberley was a hype of activity. This was when multitudes of school kids from various local Kimberley schools flocked to the facility for important swimming lessons. The lessons were rolled out by the South African National Defence Force together with officials from Department of Sport, Arts and Culture and its federations. One of the schools in attendance was Floors Primary School whose learners could not hide their excitement.

SANDF's Captain Tumelo Tlhakudi was one of the swimming instructors from the Air Force Base and says the project is aimed at decreasing the rate of children who often drown. *"Furthermore we'd like to entice the young ones to show them that there is more to the army than just guns and war"*.

A local swimming instructor Faried Josephs from Northern Cape Aquatic Sports Association was also present to assist and make sure that this initiative does not end here. *"I would like to indicate to our youths interested in swimming that the Floors North Primary School swimming pool is being renovated and interested parties are welcome to join the swim team. We cannot teach a person how to swim in one day, we need to nurture and instil all the basic skills that are needed for one to be a good swimmer"*, said Josephs.



Eleven year old Junior Maseko from Floors North Primary mentioned how excited he is to be taught how to swim. The young Maseko says being from a disadvantaged background and having not being exposed to swimming facilities before, it really thrills him to be given this once in a life time opportunity.

Many young stars were peddling and kicking water holding on to the swimming boards and stroking with unbridled passion. Meanwhile at Galeshewe Stadium multitudes were having the time of their lives, enjoying clinics in various sporting codes including soccer, rugby, netball, softball and football amongst others.

Remember we are not just here to bring these displays, but we are also showcasing the opportunities that are available for young people, for school leavers, for children that otherwise do not have other ways to get educated, and to teach our young people life skills. The most important part of this Armed Forces Day celebrations and the buildup events is to foster closer interactions between the military and South African civilians."* said Lieutenant-General Masondo.

He says Armed Forces Day has since been hosted in five provinces including Free State, Kwazulu Natal, Western Cape and Eastern Cape provinces.

The Pretoria based Gugulethu Masimela says she joined the South African Navy back in 2015. Masimela who was only 22 years old when joining the force expresses her appreciation towards the service. *"I feel blessed to be in this faculty because before joining I knew nothing about swimming due to lack of facilities in my area. I was very scared of water until I went on training where I could jump in the ocean in the middle of the night. I must say that by being a soldier I have learnt a lot of responsibility, independency, perseverance and to never give up"*.

Up Close And Personal With Mr. Eugene Mokgoasi

Can you please tell us about yourselves, who is Eugene Mokgoasi?

Am the second born son of a family of seven (7) originally from old Green Point next to the Airport. My family was forcibly removed and relocated to now Galeshewe in 1969 in terms of the Group Areas Act.

Give us your Brief Educational Background?

I went to St Peters Catholic School, then Sol Plaatje lower and back to another Catholic Institution called St. Boniface. I survived there until just before my final Matric exams. I instead completed my matric in 1983 on Robben Island after my arrest and conviction for terrorism in 1980-81. I studied further with Unisa for a B-Admin in Industrial Psych and Development Admin.

We understand that Rre Mokgoasi is a political activist who fought against the evil apartheid system, can you please share that important background with us?

The reason for my imprisonment was basically our fight against the evil system of Bantu Education. In keeping with the grant scheme of the Apartheid ideology, the education system was designed to deliberately instil a ghostly sense of inferiority in the black population while promoting geurocentric superiority on the other end. Challenging the Education bastion was regarded as treason by the apartheid state. This is consistent with the ideological architecture because "Bantu Education" was a pivotal pillar in keeping the system intact. The basic understanding was to target the "collective minds" of the black population at infancy and progressively subject it to psychological oppression and mental or spiritual subjugation.

Anyone who challenged any aspect of the ideology was the ENEMY and was either killed, silenced, jailed or all of them.

SOCIAL COHESION AND NATION BUILDING

We need to develop and individual understanding of our past and how the Apartheid machinations were designed to divide us and rip us apart, this understanding can be gained from a study of the historically collective oppression of us as a nation. In the comprehension of how colonial and apartheid distinction targeted our culture and therefore our identity can enlighten us in beginning to construct a framework of a cohesive society. We need to have a clear view and understand first of What happened?

How to redefine ourselves?

How to define ourselves ultimately.

What plans do you have to ensure the recognition of previously marginalized languages such as those of the Khoisan communities so that they don't perish?

First language, like all socio cultural entities will always undergo change, the change in language is underpinned by the constant and inevitable change of the material conditions that prevail at anytime in the history of the people. Today the digital age is materially, compelling the whole thing into the common language, a global language of some sort. Notwithstanding it is imperative that each language from each community must be preserved as part of the global linguistic tapestry, this is because language is the defining characteristic of a person. It also embodies the deepest spiritual, emotional and psychologically intrinsic values of a person.

Language says "I am" 'WE ARE'!!

Colonialism and Racism have systematically ravaged the Cultures, and therefore the language of those this evil system became subject to. A stark example is that of "African-American" "in the Diaspora like in America (USA) their indigenous languages and Cultural identities have be completely erased.

The present day danger to language destruction lies not so much in the perishing of the Khoi languages but in the collective disappearance of black languages due to a subtle AN-GLO-ZATION of our Youth.

With regards to Khoi, the preservation of their language can be attained by economically empowering these communities. Self-substance of the people leads to Self-preservation of culture and language, the Afrikaners and the Jews are adequate proof.
